Thank you for your email dated 19 March 2019 requesting information under Freedom of Information Act 2000 to include the number of DLM1 Medical Examination Reports submitted to/received by the DVA annually for the past five years.

In response to your request, I can advise that we introduced a new driver licensing IT system in late November 2016, from which I have been able to access the figures contained in the table below. Unfortunately, however, I am unable to provide figures in respect of the DLM1 Medical reports received prior to December 2016, as we did not collect or hold that information in a form that can be easily retrieved from the archived version of the old database.

In addition, I would advise that the information extracted is the date the DLM1 medical report was signed, rather than the date the application was received by us.

As the database is a live system which is subject to ongoing changes and updates, as a drivers' circumstances change and new applications are submitted, this information may be overwritten and consequently we may not be in a position to extract accurate historical data on DLM1's received.

The information in relation to DLM1s received annually from December 2016, is set out in the table below:
